The Adva Center -- a leading Israeli progressive think-and-do tank -- believes that all Israelis, Jews and Arabs, women and men, high- and low-income persons deserve high-quality public education, low-cost public health services, decent affordable housing, and a robust social security system.

We also believe that an active citizenry is crucial to democracy, and thereby engage in community activism and popular education programs, with an emphasis on Israel's socio-economic periphery.

Since its establishment in 1991, Adva Center has been at the forefront of the struggle to advance equality, social justice and gender-responsive programming in Israel, monitoring social and economic developments and working top-down and bottom-up with all groups composing Israeli society.

We engage in research and policy monitoring, advocacy, popular education and community action. We also maintain intensive presence in new and conventional media channels. In addition, we assist other organizations which advocate for human rights and social change to gather data and draft policy recommendations.

Our studies of Israeli society present critical analyses of public policy and highlight issues that are often neglected in the areas of budgets, taxation and social services – including their implications for Israeli society as a whole and for each of its major social groups.

Our policy-oriented reports are used by Knesset members, government officials, civil society organizations, academia, students and activists all over the country to advance egalitarian policies.

Our research and findings are translated into straightforward graphic language accessible to all.

Our community action and popular education projects operate in dozens of underserved localities countrywide and with hundreds of women and men of all groups composing Israeli society.



Advocacy, Policy Advancement and Coalitions:

For the Jewish Funders Network (JFN) – a guide to philanthropy and philanthropic trends through a gender lens.

For the Ministry for the Advancement of Women – a gender analysis of projects and budgets across six different governmental units.

Ripples:

The guide to the financial inclusion of Arab Israelis published (in cooperation with IATF) is being used by the European Investment Bank (EIB) in their negotiations with Bank Leumi to finetune the latter's strategy to support under-represented populations through lending to small and medium-sized enterprises.

Infrastructure for the Progressive Camp:

A three-year grant from the EU has positioned Adva Center as an infrastructure organization with the ability to strengthen progressive CSOs.

In the first year, we will be collaborating with the ASSAF organization in monitoring a Ministry of Welfare reform and in advocating for the expansion of welfare and rehabilitation services to asylum seekers with disabilities.

In the coming years, Adva Center's monitoring and research expertise is to be put at the service of four (4) additional CSOs.

Local Government:

Adva Center's work at the central government level is complemented with a "zoom in" on municipal policies – bottom-up and top-down -- training of senior duty bearers, gender audits of municipal budgets, and the operation of community action projects with residents and activists:

In the framework of a joint project with WePower,

Adva's researchers gave a series of lectures (in Hebrew and in Arabic) to aspiring women politicians in the following communities: Menashe Regional Council, Hadera, Eshkol Regional Council, Netanya, Beit Shemesh, Drom Hasharon Regional Council, Umm el Fahm, Nof Hagalil and Ramat Gan. This, to train and instill tools for gender-sensitive budgeting

ahead of the municipal elections. In addition, lectures and workshops on gender mainstreaming of local government were presented to department heads and deputies at these communities: Eilat, Ashdod, Yahud-Monoson, Dir el Assad and Majdal Shams.

Following the gender analysis of the sports budgets of the Hof HaCarmel Regional Council, Adva's gender team is now assisting the municipality to develop an overall strategic plan to promote gender equality.

Ripples:

The research-community action project in Haifa resulted in a conference on the issue of public housing in Kiryat Bialik, attended by over 50 public housing residents, many of them Ethiopian-Israelis, the mayor and MK Naama Lazimi.

Subsequently, the municipality nominated one of the leading local activists to help residents exercise their rights.

ISRAEL AT WAR:


The brutal attack on Israeli citizens on October 7th and the ensuing war dramatically affects Israeli society in numerous ways.

Adva published around twenty position papers, budget analyses and reports about the socioeconomic implications of the war on the weakest members of society, including the <u>disparate impact on women's employment, compared to that of men</u> (English, Hebrew), <u>the implications of the war on women who were let go following the rise in women's retirement age</u> (Hebrew), <u>the exclusion of women from decision making bodies in time of war</u> (Hebrew), the <u>consequences of the arming of the Israeli civilian population on women</u> (Hebrew, English), the <u>partnership of Arab men and women in the medical professions</u> (Hebrew, English, Arabic), and more (<u>see here</u>).

Adva policy recommendations received significant media attention, and some were presented in Knesset committees.

Our policy recommendation to add a significant number of safe rooms through urban renewal projects in peripheral localities, was adopted by the Home Front Command.

WOMEN AT WAR



The war affects Israeli men and women differently. Some women are on the front lines, but most are back at the home front, where they play a pivotal role as primary caretakers of children and the elderly, and in projects designed to begin the process of healing for fractured communities. Women constitute the majority of essential workers on emergency response teams, and in social, health and educational services. They are often the first to bear the brunt of surges in domestic abuse that occur during times of crisis. It is well documented that women experience higher rates of PTSD compared to men following triggering events.

On the "day after," women will be the ones who pick up the pieces, care for the wounded, the bereaved, and the traumatized. To ensure that public services are responsive to their needs, it is crucial to include women in decision-making processes, amplify their voices and ensure that their needs and concerns are addressed.

Adva Center is located at a distinctive crossroad: it has been a longstanding partner to a network of women's organizations, while simultaneously acting as an advisor to the Ministry for the Advancement of Women.

This unique dual position enables us to facilitate and stimulate a constructive dialogue between the third sector (civil society organizations) and the government, as well as to advance gender-sensitive policies and programs.

Adva's collaboration with the Ministry for the Advancement of Women initially focused on conducting gender-based analyses of projects and budgets across six different governmental units. With the onset of the war, the original project was adapted: Adva Center would provide guidance to the Ministry so as to guarantee that all ministries and agencies take into account the unique concerns and needs of women.

Similarly, Adva's collaboration with the Ministry of Health has resulted in the endorsement of standardized gender-specific medical protocol across all national healthcare providers, taking into account women's experiences on October 7th and thereafter and their possible medical implications.

Together with a coalition of women's organizations, Adva created a comprehensive report on the direct impact of the war on women, and especially minority women. It was presented to the Socio-Economic Cabinet. The report included a demand that the government develop programs to address women's specific needs in regard to domestic violence, employment, health, and childcare.

Adva also joined a call demanding that women be included in the hostage negotiations team. Adva's collaboration with the Ministry for the Advancement of Women has broadened the dialogue among pertinent authorities regarding the influence of gun distribution on women.

Presently, we are engaged in developing a comprehensive database on the extent of violence against women and its diverse manifestations. Furthermore, we are in the process of establishing a "bank" of women experts spanning diverse disciplines. These experts will be available to assist the Ministry on an ad-hoc basis in times of crisis.

ZOOM-IN:

SHARED DESTINY WITH ARAB ISRAELIS

The shared destiny of the Jewish and Arab populations in Israel, the joint civil challenges and common interests – in normal times as in war – are being examined and highlighted by Adva researchers Dr. Miri Endeweld Sabag and Dr. Fahima Abbas. Focus is on the pivotal role of Arab citizens in the healthcare system, educational institutions and more.

An examination of the differential implications of the housing crisis on Arab women in Israel, with a specific focus on the unique set of needs and challenges of divorced Arab women, has just been completed. The second paper in the planned series of publications about Arab women in Israel will


focus on the hurdles related to commuting. This analysis will examine employment opportunities for Arab women in or near their homes, the availability and suitability of public transportation, childcare options and more.

Ripples:

Adva has successfully advocated for an increase in the accessibility of health services, including family health centers (Tipot Halav), to Bedouin mothers residing in "unrecognized" villages in the Negev.

Popular Education

Adva's lectures and workshops on Israeli society have educated thousands of Israelis -- staff members of central government offices, local authorities and civil society organization; cadets in public service leadership-development programs; community activists; student programs; pre-army preparatory programs and others -- about the issues that most impact their lives and livelihoods, motivating them to take an active part in the shaping of local, regional and national policies.

In 2023 we conducted

65 lectures and workshops, including **20** lectures to young people in IDF preparatory programs, students and cadets and a series of sessions with aspiring women politicians.

Dr. Baka Mawassi


